

Simple Secrets to Keep from Getting Overwhelmed by Family History

Secret #1: Identify why you feel overwhelmed by family history work (with possible solutions):

- ☐ I don't have the knowledge needed
 - Come to the family history center or ask ward T&FH consultant for help
- ☐ I don't know where to begin
 - Pray for inspiration; Ask: "What would my ancestors want me to do?"
- ☐ I have many projects that are started but not finished
 - Make a complete list of projects you have ACTUALLY started; commit to
 - completing the most important ones step by step before starting any new projects; delete projects that are no longer important; Just because you have "stuff" doesn't mean you have started a project

something.

- ☐ Doing family history brings up painful emotional issues
 - Pick a family history project, such as attaching record hints, that is more generic until you feel ready to tackle the more personal projects
- ☐ I don't have enough time
 - You will never FIND time; you will have to MAKE time. Look for small bits of time that are not productive and commit them to doing family history

SOLUTION IF YOU FALL INTO THE DETOUR CATAGORY: Learn about your ancestors lives. Go to FamilySearch>Memories. Look at photos of them. Read stories about their lives. Imagine what life was like for them. Remember that they are real people and that you are here because of them.

Secret #2: Identify what family history work actually is and any family history you have already done.

Secret #3: Identify any family history knowledge you have OR family history documents in your possession that have not been preserved for the future.

Secret #4: Identify possible family history projects for **YOU**.

Clue words: "I PROBABLY should..." or "I NEED to..."

Most important key: Pray to ask the Holy Ghost to help you know what you personally should be doing.

Secret #5: Pick only ONE SMALL, SPECIFIC Project.

Secret #6: Identify an end goal for the project. What will "contain" the project when it is completed? What does finished "look like"?


Hard What is the simplest possible solution that still meets the need? Family history is never "done", but each project needs a finish line.

Secret #7: Identify the FIRST SMALL STEP to complete that project. Caution here: Be aware of opportunities that may come your way unexpectedly. Avoid tunnel vision that may cause you to miss important chances.

Secret #8: Your step probably isn't small enough yet. **Identify a next action or TINY TASK** that can be contained and done in a reasonable amount of time.

Practical tips:

- Quick Start Log—allows you to pick up and put down a project without wasting time; NOT a research log
- Take some time to establish a Note-Taking system that works the way your brain works and works with the project you have chosen; Research logs can be part of this system
- Going Digital & File Naming System: https://www.preservingtime.org/going-digital-with-your-genealogy.html
- Storage "Box"—Physical or Digital



Secret #9: Do your TINY TASK. If you pick a small thing and actually do it, you won't have to feel guilty or overwhelmed when family history is mentioned again.

Secret #10: Tell your brain to leave you alone when it tries to remind you of things you aren't doing. Remind yourself of the task you ARE DOING.

"We gathered together everything we had, and in the course of a few weeks we were amazed at what we were able to accomplish. The thing that was most impressive, however, was the fact that we began to have experiences that told us somehow that we were being guided, that there were those beyond the veil who were interested in what we were doing...We began to learn by personal experience that this research into our families is an inspired work. We came to know that an inspiration will follow those who move into it. It is just a matter of getting started.

"Once we started, we found the time. Somehow we were able to carry on all of the other responsibilities. There seemed to be an increased inspiration in our lives because of this work.

"But the decision, the action, must begin with the individual. The Lord will not tamper with our agency. If we want a testimony of family history and temple work, we must do something about that work." From "The Holy Temple" by President Boyd K. Packer

BONUS SECRET: Adopt a New Perspective: "A long To-Do list is the sign of an abundant life."
