Tips:

- 1. Read all the information on the record for more clues.
- 2. Don't get sidetracked- stick with your research goal/question.
- 3. There are government and church census records.
- 3. Remember just because it is a record, doesn't mean it is always correct.
- 4. Verify facts with more than one source.
- 5. If you don't find the record, check back later. Most websites/repositories are constantly gathering records.
- 6. Evaluate the records- Primary Source or Secondary Source? Was it created near the event or by first hand knowledge?
